<b>Subject</b>	Board resignations
<b>Message</b>	<p>The two board members elected on 2024 have now resigned within a year. Under the previous leadership at least a half dozen board members resigned before the end of their terms. This amount of personnel turnover for such a small organization indicates a systemic issue with the CCWD. This kind of turnover does not serve the community customer base well. Perhaps the 50 plus year old charter of the CCWD is no longer viable. Times, technology, laws and regulations, and the demographic of the residents has changed. It is possible that in the current government and economic environment, a board consisting solely of property owners is no longer capable of setting policy and getting the needed work funded and completed. When CCWD was chartered by the legislature in the early 1970s, the residents were members of the Greatest Generation that had survived the Great Depression and World War II through perseverance and sacrifice. They had built Canebrake from nothing and had skills and knowledge that are rare in today's residents. It could be time to develop alternatives to the current CCWD structure, possibly including outside board members with specific water district management experience and training. The CCWD issues remain: 1. Establish an economic plan that provides for continued maintenance and upgrade of the system. 2. Establish a task plan, a resource plan and a funding plan to replace the fifty- to sixty-year-old delivery infrastructure, including pipes and tanks in the next twenty to thirty years. Finally, do not re-appoint persons who have previously quit. These people have already demonstrated they are unreliable when problems arise. Bob Fritz 20 January 2026</p>
